The Library is now responsible for obtaining copyright permission for course reserve materials. The Library's decision to ask for copyright permission is based solely on the copyright law of the United States (Title 17, U.S. Code). In that code are the "fair use" guidelines and how they apply to photocopies or other reproductions. Under certain conditions of "fair use", libraries and archives are authorized to furnish a photocopy or other reproduction without obtaining copyright permission. Fair use is determined through a case by case analysis. "The mere fact that a use is educational and not for profit does not insulate it from a finding of infringement . . ." *Campbell v. Acuff-Rose Music, Inc.*, 510 U.S. 569, 584 (1994).

The following four factors must be considered when determining fair use:

1. The purpose and character of the use, including whether such use will be for nonprofit or educational use.
2. The nature of the copyrighted work.
3. The amount, substantiality, or portion used in relation to the copyrighted work as a whole.
4. The effect of the use on the potential market of the copyrighted work.

Please note that copyright law and the guidelines of "fair use" apply to **electronic reserves** as well as photocopies or other reproductions housed behind the library circulation desk.

Copyright permission is required whenever an item placed on reserve for more than one semester, consecutive or not: whenever the item is a copyrighted workbook, test, test booklet, or answer sheet. (Copyright permission is always required, even for a one semester use of these materials.); and whenever an item is more than a very brief excerpt.

Anthologies, or collections of photocopies or reprints, will not be accepted. Each article or reprint must be treated as a separate item

and listed separately on the request form. Course Packets can be processed through the FGCU bookstore.



The Library uses the Copyright Clearance Center to obtain the majority of the copyright permissions. Occasionally we must contact the rights holder directly. Permission may or may not be granted, so it's a good idea to have alternate materials in mind when planning your course reserves.

◆ Library Begins Electronic Books Collection

FGCU Library now has access to a collection of electronic books through netLibrary.

Net Library offers reference, scholarly, and professional electronic books (ebooks). Currently netLibrary offers thousands of ebooks that have been converted into electronic format from copyrighted, printed books and a large collection of ebooks from the public domain that are available free-of-charge to netLibrary members.

On the netLibrary website you can search titles, authors, and keywords, as well as the entire text of any ebook. You can view ebooks for 15 minutes for quick reference, or borrow them for 24 hours. You don't have to worry about returning them, because they automatically return themselves. Access to this service is limited to FGCU students, faculty and staff. You will need your FGCU Network username and password to gain access to this service.

In order to check out an ebook, you must first create a free account with netLibrary. This is similar to creating a free email account through Yahoo or Hotmail. You are required to provide your full name and email address, but please note that the **mailing address and other personal information is NOT required.**

Once you have created your account, you can check out books from "The Public Collection," which includes works in the public domain, and from "My Library's Custom Collection," which is a set of titles FGCU Library has purchased from netLibrary. Titles in "The Private Collection" are unavailable.

◆ Library Instruction at FGCU

Locating and using information has become increasingly complex. New technologies allow us to do much research without even setting foot in a library. Along with this abundance comes the responsibility to introduce students to the new methods of research appropriate to their level and their areas of study.

The FGCU Library offers many ways to reach faculty and their students and introduce them to the vast array of services and resources available through the Library. Look in future issues of the *Eagle Advantage* for more detailed information about our Library Instruction programs.

Our library instruction efforts are described in the FGCU Library Information Literacy Program, which is based on the Association of College and Research Libraries *Information Literacy Competency Standards for Higher Education* and guided by the FGCU Mission Statement and the FGCU Student Learning Outcomes. This document, which is available on the Library's web page, outlines the Library's goal to develop instruction programs that address information literacy skills for students at a variety of levels.

This Issue: Kathy Hoeth, Interim Dean of Library Services



Kathy Hoeth has been Associate Dean of Library Services at FGCU since August of 1997. Prior to that, she was Deputy Director of the Lee County Library System for four years.

Dean Hoeth is working as the Interim Dean of Library Services for Dr. Carolyn Gray, who is filling in as the Interim Dean of the College of Arts & Sciences.

Kathy earned her Master of Library Science degree from the State University of New York at Albany in 1981. Her professional accomplishments include participating in the ACRL/Harvard Leadership Institute, presenting a paper on the electronic library to the Florida Chapter of the Association of College and Research Libraries, and being appointed to the State Library of Florida's Continuing Education and Staff Development Task Force.

Originally from New York, she lives in Cape Coral with her husband and son. The Hoeths keep salt-water fish and a cat named "Kit Kat"—after the candy bar. (Kit Kat is more commonly addressed as "Cat".)

She is currently serving on FGCU's University Honors Board and on the Graduate Council.

◆ Library Gets Ready to Grow

FGCU Library has received \$500,000 from the State for the purpose of planning a library expansion. The Library will soon need additional space in order to serve FGCU's growing student body.

A library expansion is currently on the three-year PECO project list for capital expenditures. If the Legislature approves funding for construction, the new building could be up by 2005.

It is too early in the process to make any assumptions about what kind of building may re-

sult, but with well over half of scholarly publishing still not available electronically, more room for books, serials, videos, and other materials is one consideration.

Another is the need for students to have a place to study, and Kathy Hoeth, Interim Dean of Library Services, is hopeful that they will be a part of the planning process. Ideally, Dean Hoeth would like to see some form of planning advisory board, with representation from both the faculty and the student body.
